Underlying this theme is a focus on a global, integrative, and multidisciplinary conference where diverse perspectives are shared. In line with this theme, we have planned a Presidential Symposium that focuses on global perspectives on infant research. In a series of invited talks, we have a broad range of topics from language diversification, comparative cross-cultural research, gender development, and many other exciting and timely areas. We have also invited talks on historical perspectives on childhood, talks from the producers of child-directed media, and from AI experts. We are organising a 'Meet the Expert' event at the Glasgow Science Museum, and members of our board are forging long-term relationships with Early Years Scotland and other early yearsfocused organisations in Glasgow, to ensure a lasting legacy for our stay. We have planned a series of social events that we hope will help you to connect with friends, colleagues, and make new connections. There will also be a number of events organised by the student committee, aimed at making the attendance enjoyable and inspiring especially for first-time attendees and students. 




